The University of La Verne Law Review is seeking submissions for our Volume 31 (2009-2010) Symposium Issue on Immigration, to be published in April 2010. As part of our goal to publish the most cutting edge work in the field, we would like to offer students writing in the area of immigration law the opportunity to submit a Note or Comment to be considered for our Student Writing Contest.

The grand prize is \$200 and publication in Volume 31. The winner will be announced at our Immigration Symposium, to be held on February 19-20, 2010. The winner will also be invited to present his or her paper to an audience including leading experts in the immigration law field at the Symposium. (Finalists may also be eligible for publication at the discretion of the Editorial Board of the Law Review.) An eligible Note or Comment must have been written while the author was an enrolled student in an ABA-approved law school during the 2009 calendar year. No paper that has been previously published in any form will be considered.

Submissions must include a cover page which identifies the author's name and law school affiliation, the title of the paper, and contact information including mailing address, telephone number, and current email address. An abstract of the submission should follow the cover page. The author's name, school or any identifying

information must not appear on any page of the Note or Comment except for the cover page.

All submissions must be emailed to lawrevsymposium@ulv.edu and received by January 1, 2010. Early submissions are encouraged.

All submissions will be evaluated based on writing quality and clarity; the interest of the topic and content to the legal community; analysis and reasoning; timeliness, originality and creativity; and quality and use of research. All submissions must contain proper attribution. Citations, footnotes and endnotes must be in accord with the either the 18th or 19th edition of *The Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation*. Papers will be anonymously evaluated and the prize will be awarded at the sole discretion of a panel of outside judges.

CANCELLATION OF LIBRARY PRINT MATERIALS

In the wake of the state budget cuts to the University of Washington, the law library has cancelled our continuing subscriptions to many important legal resources. We have been working to properly label many of these works so you will know which ones have been discontinued for now. We hope that a better budget forecast or significant private support will allow us to renew some of these subscriptions in the future.

As always, when you use any legal information source (print or digital), be sure you know how current the information is, and update accordingly. The Reference Librarians can help you find alternate sources, so don't hesitate to ask for their help.

IDENTIFYING CANCELLED MATERIALS

Many of our titles in the Reference Area have been affected by budget cuts. So, how will you know which materials are current and which are out of date? First, you will find a "Cancellation Block" on the shelf at the end of each cancelled title. Second, Cancellation Blocks will have a red or yellow border on the spine, and a red or yellow exclamation mark on the spine and the front.

Yellow Cancellation Blocks identify a series that has been cancelled. The information in all the existing volumes is still correct, but we will not receive any future volumes.

For this type of title, the Cancellation Block indicates the last volume purchased by the Library:

Example: *West's Bankruptcy Reporter*, KF1515.A2 W47. This series has been cancelled as of v. 402.

Red Cancellation Blocks identify titles that have been cancelled and will no longer be updated with new volumes, revised pages, pocket parts, or supplements. Information in some of these volumes may be out of date. Volumes that might contain out-dated information will be marked with a red sticker.

For this type of title, the Cancellation Block will indicate the date when the volumes in the set were last updated:

Example: Uniform Commercial Code Case Digest (KF880.3 .P5) has been cancelled.

NEW WESTLAW PASSWORD REQUIREMENTS

Westlaw is now requiring all users to create a username and password, instead of simply your original alpha-numeric password. This requirement will affect everyone except current 1Ls, new LLM/PhD students, and new faculty/staff. The username and password, referred to as OnePass, will be required for you to log in to Westlaw, lawschool.westlaw.com, and TWEN.

Even though you might already use OnePass, you may need to update your username and password to meet Westlaw's new, more stringent security requirements. If you created your own username and password prior to November 1, 2009, and they don't meet the new OnePass requirements, you must re-register.

If you do not have a strong password (username and password of 8-70 characters using a combination of capitals, numbers or characters) you will be notified starting November 1, 2009 that you need to create (or update) your OnePass login information. This notice will appear after you sign-on to your account using your current username and password. If you do not update your OnePass prior to January 31, 2010, you will be required to update your password at your next log-in.

MATTHEW W. HILL SCHOLARSHIP

Public Service Scholarship: \$2,450 for 2L's and 3L's

The Matthew W. Hill Scholarship Fund was established in honor and memory of Justice Matthew Hill who was a member of the State Supreme Court from 1946 to 1969. Justice Hill passed away at age 94 in 1989. The Scholarship Fund was established by gifts from lawyers who served as Justice Hill's Law Clerks during his 26 years on the Supreme Court, including three who later became Justices of the Supreme Court themselves.

It is recommended that the scholarship should generally be limited to a single recipient each year and that it should be awarded to a second or third year student on the basis of their demonstrated financial need and a record of personal interest and involvement in civic or community activities and public service.

Application should include:

- Application cover sheet*
- Resume
- An essay (no more than 3 pages) describing your involvement in civic or community activities and public service. You can discuss involvement in activities and service before or during your Law School career.

Improving the Business Climate Under the Hot Sun: Do Small Business Associations Make a Difference – A Study of Western Kenya

Small businesses offer a major source of employment opportunities in Sub-Saharan Africa. However, most micro and small enterprises on the continent do not expand but remain small. The inability of smaller businesses to grow into medium size businesses is perceived as an obstacle for economic growth. It has therefore been widely recognized that governments need to create an enabling business environment which provides opportunities and incentives for enterprises to invest and grow. This research project explores whether non-state actors- in form of small business associations could take actions which improved their members' business environment. Based upon field work from western Kenya, this presentation will discuss the potential benefits small business associations could have and what it is that small business associations in western Kenya actually do. This research project provides insight into whether the support of business associations is a viable development strategy.

An alumna of the University of Washington School of Law (LL.M. '03), Elin Cohen is a J.S.D candidate at Stanford Law School. As a Fulbright-Hays scholar, she conducted field work in western Kenya from May-December 2007. She also holds a LL.M degree from Stockholm University, Sweden. In addition, she has worked for the Swedish International Development and Cooperation Agency (SIDA) in Kenya and has studied international law in France.

As a volunteer interpreter, you will assist clients of the Clinical Law Program (CLP) and Immigrant Families Advocacy Project (IFAP). In addition to IFAP cases, volunteers have interpreted for the Children and Youth Advocacy Clinic, Innocence Project Northwest Clinic and the Federal Tax Clinic.

Interpreting assignments involve phone conversations and face-to-face interviews as well as document translations. Assignments are offered via email--you decide whether to volunteer for the assignments. In most instances, dates and times for the interpretation are set in coordination with your fellow law student who is assisting the client; thus, providing maximum scheduling flexibility. Most assignments do not require any travel.

Although requiring only a few hours of your time during the year, by volunteering you will provide invaluable public service and experience the satisfaction of helping others.
