The ABA Veterans Child Support Project was created to assist homeless and at-risk veterans whose child support obligations are a major barrier to their self-sufficiency. Child support modifications and renegotiating arrearage payments can resolve license revocations, reduce garnishments that impede on a veteran’s ability to pay his or her own bills, and adjust monthly child support payments to affordable amounts.

To recruit and train pro bono attorney and law student volunteers, the Veterans Child Support Project will hold a “Child Support 101” CLE at Seattle University School of Law on October 29, 9am – 4:30pm. Your SBA met up with the folks in the Center for Professional & Leadership Development to lend the student perspective to some of their new initiatives and give some suggestions on how the Center can be more helpful to students.

Leadership is the focus of the Center this year, aligning the UW Law with many of the other professional schools on campus as well as many other top-tier law schools. Leadership development will focus on gaining skills necessary to become effective leaders. Classes on leadership will be taught this year, and students will have the opportunity to take a "leadership assessment" which can help guide skill development.

The staff at the Center has also expanded; Ester Kang and Anna Buzard have recently been hired to help coach students through the process of finding a job. Ester and Anna are already looking for ways to connect with students and do what they can to help.

Voicing some of the students concerns, your SBA discussed ways of addressing what to do after OCI, how to better get career information out to the students and effective ways of communicating all the services the Center offers. Armed with this information, expect to see the Center hosting some interesting lunch panels and exploring creative ways to get information to students.

"WEEKEND WRAP-UP": A TORTS REVIEW SESSION FOR 1LS, HOSTED BY THE STUDENT ANIMAL LEGAL DEFENSE FUND

Sunday, October 17, Room 207

Experiencing anomie, confusion, or distress? Welcome to law school, class of 2013! But not to fear: the UW Chapter of the Student Animal Legal Defense Fund is here to help. Allow us to introduce "Weekend Wrap-Up": A torts review session for 1Ls. Each of the three torts classes has an hour devoted to summarizing, integrating, and enhancing the material studied the week prior, including questions and answers: 1-2pm: review material discussed in Prof. Zang's class; 2-3pm: review material discussed in Prof. Porter's class; and 3-4pm: review material discussed in Prof. Townsend's class. This will be a weekly event (though times may vary), helping supplement the classes. Weekend Wrap-Up CANNOT supplant the course and will work best for students who are caught up on their reading.

Since each professor's class has a different schedule of readings, each review section will be tailored to reinforce the concepts that class has read about the previous week. Sample problems will be used to illustrate major points of law as well as practical application of the curriculum. Following a brief reminder of the doctrine that was developed in the case book, the review sections will tackle (with guidance, of course) a set of legal problems based on actual cases. The discussion immediately following will emphasize how spot relevant factual patterns and develop a legal theory.

**"Challenges of the Marine Judge Advocate:
From the Courtroom to the Battlefield"**

The Military Law Association will be hosting Colonel Joseph Lisiecki, USMC, to speak on how the US handles crimes committed by US service-members during armed conflict overseas. Colonel Lisiecki recently presided over the high-profile trials of several Marines accused of killing civilians in Iraq.

Joseph P. Lisiecki III is a veteran trial attorney who now serves as an Administrative Law Judge for the U.S. Social Security Administration's Office of Disability Adjudication and Review in Los Angeles. He earned a Bachelors of Arts degree from the Northern Illinois University and his Juris Doctor from the John Marshall Law School. He served in the Marine Corps as a Judge Advocate for 7 years before leaving active duty and transferring to the United States Marine Corps Reserve. While on active duty, he served as a legal assistance attorney, prosecuting trial counsel, defense counsel, senior defense counsel, and review officer.

Currently, Judge Lisiecki holds the rank of Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve and is the 12th Marine Corps District Reserve Support Officer and Officer in Charge of the 12th Marine Corps District Reserve Support Unit. Previously, he served as a General and Special Court Martial Military Judge, certified in accordance with Articles 27(b) 42(a) & (c) of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Additionally, he was recalled to active duty in 2004 where he served as the Deputy Commander of a Marine Corps Civil Detachment, operating in the Al Anbar Province of Iraq.

Judge Lisiecki is a member of the State Bar of Illinois; U.S. Federal District Court, Northern District of Illinois; State Bar of Colorado; State Bar of California; U.S. Federal District Court, Northern, Eastern, Southern, and Central Districts of California; and the U.S. Military Court of Appeals.

UWLS FOOD AND BEVERAGE POLICY FOR STUDENTS GROUPS

“Food and/or drinks may not be served in classrooms or other meeting spaces (conference rooms, hallways, etc.) in William H. Gates Hall unless the host organization(s) has signed the ‘Food/Beverage Agreement’ and has it on file with Academic Services and the SBA Vice President for Student Organizations (if an SBA-funded RSO) and at least two business days prior to the event or meeting and a primary contact person who will be responsible for the event has been identified.

“As stated in the agreement, subject to monetary penalty and/or denial of room use privileges, the host organization(s) must clean the room so that it is available for regular use immediately following the reserved time. This may include wiping tables and vacuuming the floor. Any trash and related items must be removed from the room and properly disposed of in waste and recycling receptacles. Items that will not fit into waste receptacles (i.e., pizza boxes) must be placed in the appropriate dumpster or recycling container behind the William H. Gates Hall Loading Dock. Cleaning supplies will be made available in the SBA office for SBA-funded RSO’s. Trash bags are available at Academic Services, in Room 361, or at the SBA office in Room 130.”

If your group has a meeting scheduled with food or beverages provided, be sure to submit the required completed form to Academic Services (copy to the SBA) at least 2 business days prior to your scheduled

meeting or event. Once this form has been filled out and filed with both Academic Services and the SBA, you will not need to do this again for this academic year, unless the officers change.



BECOME A VOLUNTEER INTERPRETER!

If you speak a second language, the Clinical Law Program Language Bank needs your skill. All foreign languages are required.

Free interpreter training (four hours) will be provided here at the Law School. The instructor is an experienced court certified interpreter of the King County Superior **Court**.

As a volunteer interpreter, you will assist clients of the Clinical Law Program (CLP) and Immigrant Families Advocacy Project (IFAP). In addition to IFAP cases, volunteers have interpreted for the Children and Youth Advocacy Clinic, Innocence Project Northwest Clinic and the Federal Tax Clinic.

Interpreting assignments involve phone conversations and face-to-face interviews as well as document translations. Assignments are offered via email--you decide whether to volunteer for the assignments. In most instances, dates and times for the interpretation are set in coordination with your fellow law student who is assisting the client; thus, providing maximum scheduling flexibility. Most assignments do not require any travel.

Although requiring only a few hours of your time during the year, by volunteering you will provide invaluable public service and experience the satisfaction of helping others.
