The Ralph W. Johnson Native American Scholarship Fund aids Native American students who are committed to furthering the interest of the Native American community. Scholarships awarded from the fund offer these students the opportunity to advance the visions of indigenous people and tribes through service and advocacy. This Fund, and the assistance it provides to Native American students, also honors Professor Ralph W. Johnson, who as a teacher, colleague, and friend has shared the commitment and promoted the visions of the Native American community and Native American students, collectively and individually. To apply, applicants must submit the following:

Documentation of your tribal affiliation and/or descent;

A personal statement (no more than 700 words) describing your commitment and ties to the Native American community; and

One (1) letter of recommendation describing and appraising your involvement in the Native American community and dedication to principles that further the interests of the community. The letter must be in a sealed envelope and can be delivered to the Office of Admissions & Financial, Room 231

## 7. GLOBAL MONDAYS-LAW IN GLOBAL EYE MARCH 3 GLOBAL LEGAL ADVOCACY

**Please join us on Monday March 3 for a Spotlight on Legal Advocacy in Africa: Promoting Human Rights in Zimbabwe & information about RA positions to research laws affecting HIV/AIDS programs in African Countries**

Hosted by the Barer Institute for Law and Global Human Services and the Graduate Program in Sustainable International Development

At the beginning of the session, Jeff Lane, JD, MPH, and Kerry Dunne, JD, LLM candidate, will describe **RA opportunities researching laws affecting HIV/AIDS programs in African Countries**. This is part of a CDC-funded initiative between the School of Law and the Department of Global Health in support of the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR).

**Lecture: "The Role of NGOs in the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights in Zimbabwe"**  
**Charles Mutasa, Barer Fellow; LL.M. Candidate in Sustainable International Development, UW School of Law**

In African countries such as Zimbabwe, NGOs are generally viewed as the bedrock of democracy as they play a watchdog role over government with the view of promoting good governance, human rights and sustainable development. This presentation is a critical appraisal of the role and effectiveness of the strategies used by local NGOs to promote human rights in Zimbabwe. Despite the difficulties associated with an unfavorable operating environment, which includes government's defiance of court orders, politicization of state institutions and continuous harassment of human rights defenders, the NGOs have remained resilient and made significant achievements in promoting human rights in Zimbabwe. The presentation will also briefly look at the interface between the local NGOs and the African human rights regional bodies in their attempts to address the human rights challenges Zimbabwe is facing. It concludes by looking at the successes and challenges faced by the NGOs and suggest a way forward.

Charles Mutasa is a Zimbabwean who has studied political science and development studies up to Masters level. He has over 16 years of experience working for international and national non-profit organizations in Africa in the area of governance, human rights, health, poverty and general development policy. Charles work in the fields of policy research, analysis, consultancy and advocacy focuses on the importance of linking human rights and the rule of law issues with other sustainable development issues especially economics and politics with the goal of contributing to Zimbabwe's transitional justice issues

## 10. HEALTH LAW NEW COURSE OFFERINGS, SPRING QUARTER

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### a. LAW H 531--HEALTH LAW ADVOCACY (NEW)

This three-credit course uses experience-based learning to explore select aspects of legal advocacy on behalf of vulnerable patients and the confluence of legal, ethical and practical issues surrounding surrogate decision-making in the health care setting. The course will emphasize pragmatic problem solving strategies for vulnerable people in need of assistance. Students will practice the skills necessary to provide guidance and advocacy in select legal counseling and advocacy situations, including guardianship proceedings, in a supportive and congenial setting. ### b. LAW H529--HIV AND LAW (NEW)

The period from 1982 to 2012 produced a remarkable resource mobilization in the United States in response to one illness, AIDS. This course will examine the HIV/AIDS crisis in a number of different ways. First, it will explore the early chaotic days of the epidemic to examine the responses to the disease in and about the gay community. It will next explore how the disease was handled in early court decisions and legislative actions. The course will examine how communities of color addressed the issues. The course will also focus on the criminalization of disease-transmission conduct, needle exchange programs, and how the prison system was ill-equipped for handling HIV/AIDS cases. Lastly, the course will highlight some of the specific areas affected, including young persons and immigration issues, and then conclude with a summary of current issues. **Public Lecture: "Laws and Societies in Global Contexts"**

**Friday, March 7, Petersen Room, Allen Library, 2:00-3:30pm**

Eve Darian-Smith is Professor and Chair in Global Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara and an Adjunct Professor at Regulatory Institutions Network, Australian National University. She has published ten books and edited volumes as well as many essays. Her first book "Bridging Divides: The Channel Tunnel and English Legal Identity in the New Europe" won the Law & Society Association Herbert Jacob Book Prize. Other books include Laws of the Postcolonial (with Peter Fitzpatrick); New Capitalists: Law, Politics and Identity Surrounding Casino Gaming on Native American Land; Religion, Race, Rights: Landmarks in the History of Modern Anglo-American Law, and most recently Laws and Societies in Global Context: Contemporary Approaches (2013, Cambridge). She is on various editorial boards including the Canadian Journal of Law and Society and Social & Legal Studies, and she is a former Associate Editor of American Ethnologist and Law & Society Review. In Laws and Societies in Global Contexts (Cambridge University Press, 2013) Prof. Darian-Smith confront the challenge of how best to analyze sociolegal problems confronting us in the coming decades. She provides a framework for envisioning a new legal paradigm and new forms of governance that move beyond state-based solutions to deal with trenchant transnational challenges such as regional conflicts and environmental degradation. A more global sociolegal perspective takes seriously the concept of legal pluralism, and engages with multiple laws and societies within and across national borders that encompass diverse social systems based on very different historical and cultural traditions, interacting on multiple local, national, regional and global levels. Importantly, she argues that this sociolegal perspective is relevant to issues obviously "global" such as immigration law and regulating carbon emissions, as well as to local legal issues such as the death penalty, hate crime, and domestic violence that are not generally thought of in such worldly terms.
